Award Winners VIII

The Biggs Museum is proud to present this summer's feature exhibition. Award Winners VIII. This exhibition features the talents of the 2008 Individual Artist Fellows of the Delaware Division of the Arts (DDOA). This important annual group show highlights the talents of some of Delaware's finest visual, literary, and musical artists. This year's award winning artists were chosen to receive coveted fellowships from the Delaware Division of the Arts by the Delaware State Arts Council. Biggs Museum Curator Ryan Grover states, "this exhibition represents a wonderful cross-section of the wide artistic diversity of the State of Delaware". For those museum visitors interested in experiencing the local art scene at its best, Award Winners VIII is sure to be a rare and welcoming treat.

The works of all thirteen fellows in the areas of painting, photography, poetry, fiction writing, sculpture, video and musical composition will grace the changing exhibitions galleries from July 9 to October 26, 2008. Crowning this year's Delaware Masters Fellow in Visual Arts is photographer Alida Fish. Her haunting and stylized images of sea life are a unique expression of the Delmarva Peninsula. Ms. Fish is in good company with fellow photographers and their distinctive styles: the pinhole photography of Nancy Breslin and the

psychologically provocative images of Chad States. This year's painters, Karin Snoots and Andrew Wapinski, offer introspective images with wildly different styles. The socially critical works of Lori Crawford, printmaker, offer a realistic counterpoint to the whimsical stopaction animation of Paul Hluchan. Poems by Piotr Florczyk and Annette Opalczynski will be blown up and interspersed between art works hanging in the galleries. Works of fiction by Cathleen Scarpitti and Mary Kennedy will also be available to read in the exhibition, "Writer's Studio", accompanied by the musical compositions of J. Mark Haggerty. Last but certainly not least, is a sculpture installation by Robert Bickey, whose use familiar objects elicites emotional new ideas from the viewer. Award Winners VIII will open with a catered reception from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 9, 2008. Tickets to the reception are \$10 for museum members and \$12 for not-yet members and can be purchased in advance on the Biggs Museum website (www.biggsmuseum.org) and by phone at 302-674-2111. The exhibition is free and open to the public during regular museum hours. Many of the featured objects within the



exhibition will be available for purchase and 25% of the proceeds directly benefit the museum's educational programming throughout the year. Patronage of these talented local artists will help pay for artist workshops, school-group tours, public lectures and museum publications. Grover again notes, "the generosity of the featured artists of *Award Winners VIII*, coupled with the public's interest in contemporary art, has created a win-win opportunity to support artistic production and art education in our community."

Third Annual Summer Art Series

The Biggs Museum is proud to present the Third Annual Summer Workshops and Summer Art Series, scheduled from June through September 2008. The Summer Workshops and Summer Art Series will be held in conjunction with the Award Winners VIII exhibition, opening July 9, 2008. Award Winners VIII will feature the skills and works of the 2008 Delaware Division of the Arts (DDOA) fellowship recipients. This summer's Workshop Series highlights the skills of the finest professional artists in the state while conducting hand-on activities with an emphasis on art appreciation and skill development. Each program focuses on a different art-related subject in order to offer the widest possible public educational access to Delaware's fine-art community. This summer's workshops include oil painting, animation, silk painting, poetry and short story writing. Each workshop will be geared to the skill levels of those who register. In addition to the Summer Workshop Series, the Biggs Museum will be offering the Summer Art Series program: three intensive, weeklong day camps in July for children ages five through fifteen. During each session every child will make two crafts; one to take home and another to keep at the museum. At the end of the series the children will have the opportunity to display their art in the museum in a Summer Art Series exhibition.

Letter from the Curator: The Lewis View of Delaware



Within art museums, great collections of art work by a single artist are often amassed, one piece at a time, to create a representative view of their working life. Museum curators painstakingly pour over images for years trying to develop the best collection to honorably tell the story of the artist's evolving skills over time. The collection grows over time with museum efforts of cultivating donors, tracking down exceptional works, visiting auctions and galleries and raising money.

The scenario described above is the norm for most museums working to grow a world-class collection. However, at times there are wonderful exceptions. The Biggs Museum is thrilled to announce the recent gift of eighteen Jack Lewis original paintings. In the case of this important gift to the museum, the course of finding great examples of Lewis' work has been replaced with the generosity of a local collector, Mr. Paul B. Baker, and his family. The Baker-family collection is exceptional in representing a variety of the artistic styles Lewis adapted from the Social Realism of the 1930s to his use of an Expressionistic line during the 1970s and 1980s. The eighteen paintings will be an addition to two of the artist's work that the museum currently possesses. Most notable is the 1954 watercolor, *Delaware Pea Pickers*, published in the museum's 2002 catalogue of the collection. The Baker gift has vastly expanded the scope the museum's holdings by Jack Lewis to become an important center of Lewis art appreciation.

A large sampling of the Baker-family gift will be on view in the third-floor elevator hall at the Biggs Museum of American Art through the end of August 2008. These images include iconic views of various locations in Delaware such as, the Dover Green, Old Drawyers Church, the Governor Ross Plantation and the streets of Old Leipsic. We invite you to join us to celebrate this fortuitous gift to the museum as it is also a tremendous gift to the cultural legacy of Dover.










Calendar of Events



Biggs Kids is a free program for children ages 5-10 held on the first Saturday of every month. This program is intended to enrich children's understanding of art in the world around them. A segment of each program is devoted to teaching children about museums and the importance of museum etiquette. The program is open to the public and is held in the program gallery at the Museum from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. On Saturday August 2, Delaware Artist Fellowship recipient Mary Kennedy, a multi-published author, will lead a fun, interactive workshop with games and prizes. Mary Kennedy is a multi-published author and a clinical psychologist in private practice on the east coast. She writes young adult novels, middle grade fiction and mysteries. She has sold 37 novels, and has made the Waldenbooks, BookScan and Publishers Weekly best-seller lists. On September 6, Delaware Artist Fellowship recipient Pahl Hluchan will lead a workshop on the basic principles of animation. Children will create animations of objects and drawings for a zoetrope, a 19th century animation device that will be used to explain the optics of animation. Toys will be animated with the stop-motion technique of taking multiple pictures. Children should bring a toy of their choice to be the "star" of their animation.
